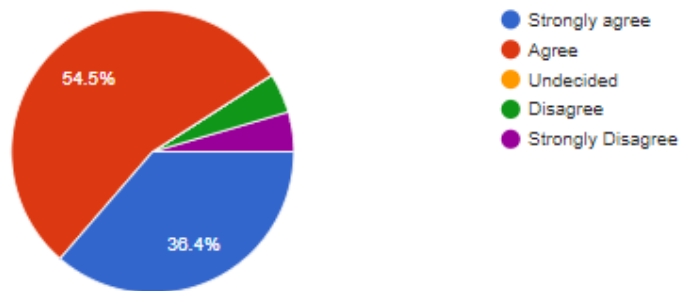


## Relationships Education

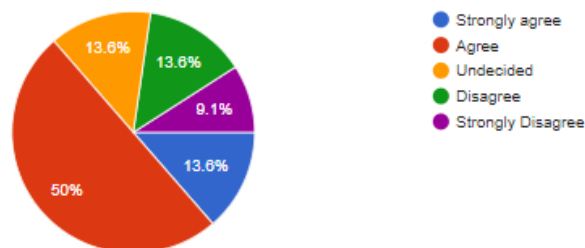
Its important for [REDACTED] to hear the information from me.

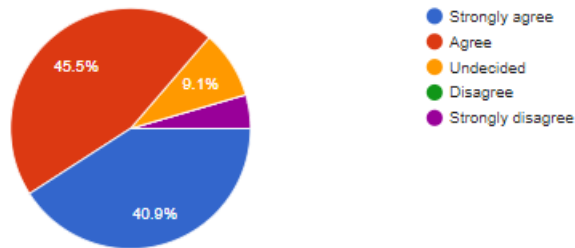

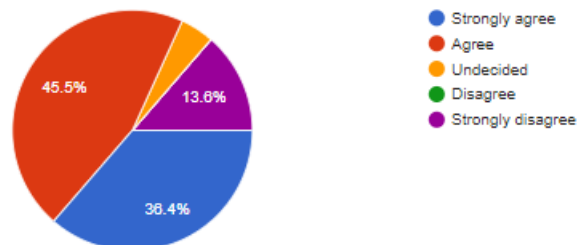

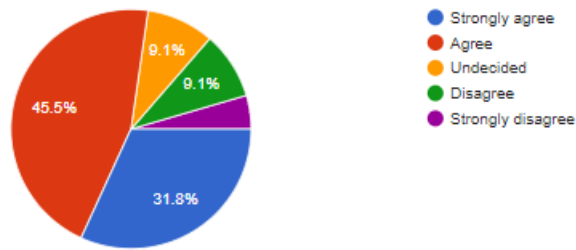

I understand the age of puberty onset is becoming earlier. Has this been decided based on data? I know girls who had their period age 8. Might year 3 be better?

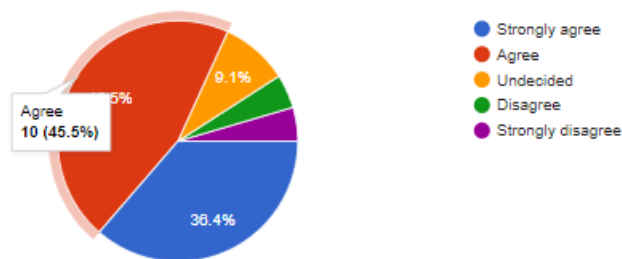

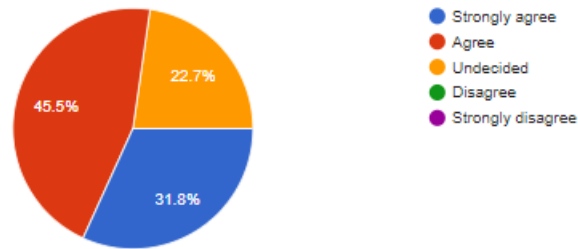

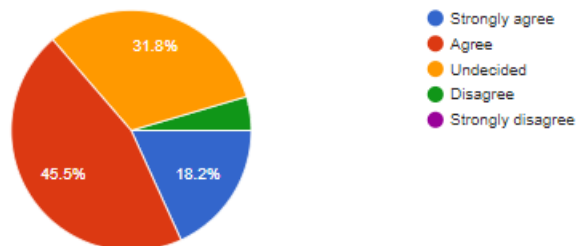
